

If you don't see what you want, ask them to search for you. Bypass the Learn section's rudimentary info on periods, styles and cabinet makers, in favor of the calendar of shows, reviews and informative articles from the Art Newspaper. Best help of all: Ask the Education Staff. We received a detailed e-mail response to our question within minutes.

Best: Authenticity guaranteed. Full refund within three days of purchase.

Worst: Average price point: \$27,000. Participating dealers should provide multiple views of these three-dimensional goods, many of which have finely carved or inlaid details. Ebay sellers do, why not the elite dealers?

You can acquire affordable repros designed by such modern masters as Charles Rennie Mackintosh, Marcel Breuer, Charles and Ray Eames or Florence Knoll. Or bring home ultrahip contemporary pieces like Philippe Starck's whimsical and sexy Dr. No chair. Mix and match a Mies van der Rohe Pavilion Chair with a Noguchi Biomorphic Coffee Table. Or create a room around such George Nelson 1950s classics such as the Marshmallow Sofa, Ball Clock and Saucer Hanging Lamp. Best: Eziba founders have pledged part of their stock to create a foundation to improve living conditions in the artisans' communities. Hope they make good.

Worst: You may need a machete to hack your way through the travelogue copy.

That is, if you can dig through the cluttered, ad-ridden design. Search by indoor, outdoor, accessories, brand names or a variety of styles from Colonial to Rustic. The ability to shop by room and style can produce some interesting results. Want a Shaker Office? No problem. Just put the Shaker-style desk with a keyboard drawer in your shopping cart. An informative e-newsletter keeps you apprised of upcoming auctions and sales.

Best: Large roster of old, reliable brands.

Worst: Wading through the clutter.

Worst: Product information is more visual than textual.

Check out 45 room views, or shop by room or product in styles like Coastal, Rustic, Classic, Soho or English Country. Look for bargains at The Outlet where many items are half-price. Custom upholstery is available on certain pieces; choose fabrics by price range, pattern and color, then view them on-screen on your desired couch, chair or ottoman.

Best: By far the most detailed product descriptions seen in this category.

Worst: The Online Decorating Studio only lets you view "pre-coordinated" selections. And scrolling horizontally through the room views is dizzying.

Guild.com www.guild.com Offers a collection of original contemporary art including a choice selection of art furniture and lighting. Expect well-crafted, often whimsical stuff with prices from a few hundred dollars to more than \$100,000. Typical: Joseph Shuldiner's delightfully delicate birchand-paper lamp shaped like a watchtower (\$1,500). Or Roger Hauge's rustic Adirondack-style chair, with a Shaker-style woven seat and back, echoing the geometric patterns of Scottish designer Charles Rennie Mackintosh (\$1,000). 3. How Much Does It Cost to Furnish a New Home?



Here's what to expect if you're budgeting for home furnishings in Sunshine Coast.

Moving into a new home is already expensive in Sunshine Coast. Now, add in the cost to fill that home with furniture and these expenses can really set you back if you aren't prepared for them—if you don't go about it in the right way. That's why budgeting for furniture is an important part of preparing financially for the cost of moving—whether you're buying or renting. However, because there are so many variables—including your home's size, location, and architectural style—figuring out exactly how much it costs to furnish a home is a bit tricky. So, we used average costs as a guide, and asked experts for tips on building a practical, personalized home furnishings budget. Here's what to expect and keep in mind when budgeting to furnish a home.

Average Cost to Furnish a Home

According to Home Advisor in Sunshine Coast, the national average cost to furnish a house is about \$16,000, but the actual range spans from \$3,500 to just shy of \$100,000. The lower end accounts for budget-friendly furnishings in smaller spaces, like studios and one-bedroom apartments, while the higher end accounts for three- or four-bedroom homes with luxury furnishings.

"The cost of furnishing a new home is a loaded question and obviously varies depending on the size of the house and the level of furnishings," says Molly McGinness, an award-winning residential interior designer based in Cape Cod. "The level of furnishings can range from highly customized topof-the-line quality to fast fashion type of furnishings. In general, most people have sticker shock when they consider the cost to fully furnish a whole room."

Factors That Affect the Cost of Home Furnishings

Room size and layout

The more extensive your home, the higher the total cost of furnishing. For example, you may only need a small two-seater for a quaint living space but need a seven-seater sectional, ottoman, and side table for a larger room. And this is about more than just square feet. The number of windows and angles of walls can also affect where you place furniture and how much of it is needed to make the space feel cozy. So, to plan out how much furniture you need (and how big it needs to me), draw up a layout of the rooms to play around with different options before you purchase anything.

Furniture quality

Not everyone is furnishing their forever home, so it's essential to think about how long you really need your furniture to last. Top-quality pieces are worthwhile to splurge on if you're hoping to hang on to them for a lifetime, but if you plan to move within just months or years, then it's best to adjust to a more modest price point. Strike the right balance by mixing higher-end pieces with thrifty saves. If you have the time to wait for durable designs to go on sale, you also might be able to spare your budget without sacrificing quality.

Delivery costs

While you can load up your car with smaller items, most home furnishings are bulky and require truck delivery. From mattresses to bed frames to couches, don't forget the delivery fees that will be tacked onto the cost of the item itself. If you're importing from another country or have goods shipped long-distance, additional freight and transport costs apply. For the lowest costs, look for online services that include delivery with the price of the furniture. Otherwise, consider purchasing multiple items from one supplier to reduce delivery costs.

Assembly costs

If you're a DIYer, you can save quite a bit, but there are some items that are best left to pro assembly. Some furniture will come with easy assembly instructions in the packaging. Still, the actual process can be time-consuming and physically challenging. Many delivery services will also offer installation and assembly for hydraulic items, modular setup, lighting, and upholstered pieces. Consider the cost of hiring a local handyperson, especially if you have a whole house to furnish.

How to Save Money on Home Furnishings

Home and real estate investor in Sunshine Coast offers a tip to "think of designing as phases." Phase one, she says, is the skeleton: It includes necessary items, like beds, couches, tables, desks, and chairs. "Phase two is design, such as rugs, curtains, and throws," she adds. "Phase 3 is the knick-knacks." To help avoid unnecessary splurges that lead to overspending, price out each phase and make purchases as your budget allows.

With each phase, you can find bargains and hunt for deals everywhere, from major retailers to custom designs to flea markets. But with this organized approach, you're prioritizing your budget toward the items you'll use and need the most. And once a "must-have" item is checked off the list, you can move on to items that just spark joy. Anything that doesn't fit or turns out to be a dud can be returned for additional savings, but keep in mind that any thrift items or those on sale might not be eligible for return.

More Considerations When Furnishing a Home

The total cost of furnishings may be higher if you have limited available time to find items and place them in your home. If time—not budget—is your biggest concern, it may benefit you to work with an interior designer. "Interior designers know which manufacturers have quick ship programs and when it makes sense to customize something directly with a trade-only source or to buy something off the floor at a local retailer," McGinness says.

Last, Cohen recommends considering whether it makes more sense to rent or buy your furnishings. Companies like Cort and Feather can help you hit the ground running if you relocate on a tight timeline. These services can offer full rooms or a la carte items. Also, rentals can be used as a stopgap to furnish your home until your favorite exclusives arrive, or they can be items you hold onto for as long as you stay in place. Keep in mind that if you hang onto rental furniture for too long, you may end up spending much more than if you'd just bought them outright.

4. Common Mistakes to Avoid When Buying Furniture, Designers Warn



If you feel it's high time to update a certain piece of furniture in your home or to finally add a piece to a room that's been sitting empty for some time, don't do so without learning some of the most common mistakes people in Sunshine Coast make when furniture shopping.

We asked designers to share some basics on what you should consider and avoid.

Match Your Lifestyle

Kate Guinness, founder of Kate Guinness Design in Sunshine Coast, points out that some homeowners tend to choose furnishings based on styles they love without fully considering the

practicalities of life. For instance, if you have pets or small children, you should most definitely steer away from buying a pristine white sofa or any other easily stainable piece the kids will have access to.

Make Sure It Physically Fits

Assuming the furniture you're eyeing is a non-flat-pack furniture piece that you need to assemble at home, you should confirm that you'll be able to physically get the piece indoors and into the space you wish to place it.

For instance, if you don't have any double-door openings in your home, or the entry into the specific room is narrow or short, you may not be able to manipulate and maneuver the piece into place. Jessica Shaw, director of interiors at The Turett Collaborative, also reminds those who live in a condo or apartment building to check that the piece can fit into the elevator since you'll need to hire someone if it doesn't and you live on an upper floor.

Consider the Style

It's one thing to make sure it fits in the door, and a whole other thing to know it fits aesthetically.

"Even if you just fall in love with the piece on the showroom or store floor, try to avoid being super impulsive and put it on hold," Shaw says.

She suggests taking a picture of it, getting a spec sheet if possible, and getting a swatch to bring home and look at against the space in which you want to place it. Or, you can even work in the reverse by taking snapshots of the room at the boutique or showroom where you saw the piece.

Don't Buy What You Can't See

Carter Averbeck, owner of Omforme Design, warns against buying any fast furniture, as in online retailers where you have only enhanced photo imagery and website claims of quality to rely on. Oftentimes, what you purchase online is not what you end up getting and some of these online brands make it difficult to return.

"Buyer's regret has never been more real or prevalent than with online furniture purchases," Averbeck says.

Know Your Limits for a Fixer Upper

If you're thrifting, checking out an estate sale, or shopping at an antique dealer, investigate everything. Shaw emphasizes the importance of making sure to check all surfaces and moving pieces. This way, you'll be able to better negotiate the price if a drawer handle is missing or damaged.

Also, be realistic about if you're going to turn it into a DIY project. "Everybody's different and has their own level of handiness," Shaw says.

Ask yourself how much needs to be refurbished and if you're actually capable of doing it right or will likely need to pay to outsource the job. If you still intend to do it yourself, think about the costs of tools and materials you'll need, whether it's to sand down and refinish a console table or reupholster a couch. You might even need to re-pad cushioning or invest in down feathers to fill spots.Sure, the people in a house are what make it a home, but the items that fill it can tell us a lot about their personalities. If you find yourself looking around your own digs and craving a refresh, perhaps a new piece of furniture is just what you need to spruce things up. But if you're concerned about your budget or you're just a smart shopper, it's essential to know the best time to buy furniture.



When is the best time of year to buy furniture?

The good news is that there's more than one time of the year that's considered the best time to buy furniture. As you may have guessed, you'll find some of the best deals around major holidays and holiday weekends—but only certain ones.

Elena Fraioli, a senior merchant manager with Skimlinks, a popular content monetization platform, suggests looking for furniture deals during what's known as the Cyber Five, aka the sales you'll find on the five days between Thanksgiving and Cyber Monday. "That's definitely when we see a surge in the home category, specifically sofas," she says. "January is also a big furniture month, because there's this theme of 'New Year, New Me,' and that bleeds into people refreshing their home as well." Plus, new furniture styles tend to be released in February, so retailers are looking to clear out their old inventory in January.

When is the best time to buy office furniture?

Now that many companies have either gone hybrid or fully remote, you'll probably want a proper home office, if you don't already have one. And if you do have one, it might be time to kick it up a notch (and not just because your coworkers are getting a good look at it on Zoom). Getting a good price on office furnishings is similar to looking at the best time to buy other indoor furniture.

With that being said, you should also check out private sales, like Amazon Prime Day and Wayfair's Way Days. On Way Days, which take place at the end of April, you'll find discounts up to 80% off. Prime Day, traditionally held in July, offers similar price cuts. You also might be able to find some deals around various holidays, but Labor Day likely won't be one of them—that goes for all indoor furniture.

When is the best time to buy patio furniture?

The best time to buy patio furniture is actually quite a bit different than the best time to buy indoor furniture. Because patio furniture is a seasonal item for most of the country, it's generally marked down at the end of the summer. Beginning in August, these outdoor items will start to get discounted, with sales getting steeper as the month goes on. By Labor Day, you should see the lowest

prices of the season on outdoor pieces. But be careful: If you wait too long, those pieces might sell out!

When is the worst time to buy furniture?

According to Fraioli, while you may see some smaller deals on furniture scattered throughout the year, the Cyber Five is really when the deepest discounts happen. As for the worst time to buy furniture, that's likely right after those sales end and prices shoot back up to their original list prices. Stores also typically introduce their new indoor-furniture styles in February and August, so prices are likely to be at their highest then.

But if there's an item you love and it's full price, don't feel bad about adding it to your cart right now. With supply-chain issues and long wait times for certain items, buying sooner rather than later may make more sense for you.

Can you negotiate furniture prices?

The short answer: it depends. If the item is a floor sample or an open-box item, the retailer is likely to have a little more flexibility when it comes to negotiation. And, of course, if you're using a site like Facebook Marketplace, there is often room to negotiate. But if you aren't dealing with a secondhand retailer or a yard-sale situation, negotiating can be difficult. Additionally, you'll need to be in person to even broach the subject, which means there's no way for a back-and-forth exchange with, say, Amazon. If you're wondering, here is how to negotiate like a pro in any situation.

Furniture-buying tips

With the best time to buy furniture fresh in your mind, here's how to make shopping for these items even easier—on you and your wallet.

Look for thematic bundles

Some retailers focused on the home space are creating bundles that include all the bells and whistles you might want to have with your big furniture purchase. For example, if you're purchasing office furniture, look for a bundle that includes some of the accessories you might need as well, such as an ergonomic chair, lamp and filing cabinet.

Buy Now, Pay Later can be a helpful payment option

"If you're hosting a party and realize you need certain pieces of furniture right away, a lot of retailers offer a Buy Now, Pay Later option," says Lex Bombino, a merchant account manager with Skimlinks. "That way, you can make those purchases, but you don't have to spend a lot at that very moment and can make incremental payments." One word of warning: Always read the fine print about interest rates and penalties if you don't pay by a certain date.

Give direct-to-consumer brands a try

Direct-to-consumer (DTC) brands, like Castlery, don't have brick-and-mortar stores, and their merchandise isn't sold on any sites other than their own. This is beneficial because you're cutting out the middle man (the third-party retailer) and instead dealing with the manufacturer directly, which can help you get a high-quality piece at a great price. Follow DTC brands on social media or sign up for their newsletters to stay up-to-date on their sales and any new markdowns. Martinez says she personally owns a few Castlery items and loves them. She also loves that they will send out free swatches so you can look at and feel the fabric before ordering.

Look for open-box or floor-sample deals

If you're shopping on a site like Wayfair, sometimes you will see mention of an "open-box price" on a particular item. This typically means that product was returned by a customer so the box was opened (hence, the name), and retailers will subsequently mark down that piece. There isn't anything inherently wrong with the product; it just wasn't what the original customer needed. Floor samples, on the other hand, are those pieces of furniture on display in a store or showroom that are rotated out at the end of the season and placed on sale because they, too, are from an open box. They may be slightly more worn, though, since customers may be trying them out. That said, floor samples are another excellent way to get a good price.

Place a packing paper at the bottom of the box and at the top of the fabric items. When packing the carpets and rugs, roll properly and wrap inside the plastic and secure it with a rubber band. Secure the Box

Once you have packed all the items in a cardboard box, it is advisable to seal the box properly with tape to ensure there is no opening.
